## Drama by 4 players

Theatre players last night gave a performance in W. Dinner and W. Morum's drama, "The Late Edwina Black," that was a credit to the stage.

They played with respect for the art of acting, and the elements of production equally were excellent. Over the years, I have seen few petter presentations from any Little Theatre group in the Albert Hall.
