of the three acts, and infused into the part the requisite degree of animation. The team work of these two was excellent, but it would be in the interests of the players to do a little judicious pruning in the second act for to-night's production. Too much time is devoted to bickering between the entrances of other players in the cabin scene on board ship. It is a scene that would be pruned in most commercial presentations.

D. Kellet Cameron, playing the part of a stuttering publicity man, was diverting and convincing, and Ralph Taylor added realistic touches to the performance. Minor parts were fairly successful, and Peggy Asprey's study of the maid-novelist particularly good.

Exceptional improvement was evident in the playing of the society's orchestra in several bright selections. Overture to "Romany Rose" (Walter) and "Butterfly Dance" (Julia Nixon) were perhaps the best offerings, although the work in other selections was smooth and well balanced.

The play will be repeated to-night.
